14th ANNUAL TEACHERS WORKSHOP – JULY 8-12, 2019

USING MARK TWAIN'S SHORT STORIES FOR WRITING INSPIRATION

The Mark Twain Museum is offering a Teacher Workshop for teachers and media specialists in grades four through high school to help them bring Twain's writings into the classroom. We hope that you will join us for this unique opportunity.

The weeklong teachers workshop has several goals: To provide teachers with background on works by Twain and his life; to experience the town that served as the fictionalized setting for his best-known books; to show how Twain's writings can be used to stimulate students' writing; and to provide a forum for discussion and creative thinking about how to approach Twain's writings in the classroom. We want to make Mark Twain accessible to you, the teachers, so you can make Mark Twain accessible to your students.

The Museum staff, with knowledgeable outside assistance, will conduct this exciting and inspiring course filled with content knowledge and new strategies for teaching Twain's works, including ready-to-use lesson plans, integrated curriculum, multiple intelligences, and innovative uses of technology – all geared to use Mark Twain's life and works to foster student writing.

During the workshop, participants will experience a taste of Twain's world. They will visit the Mark Twain Boyhood Home & Museum properties and other historic sites, follow a guided tour through Mark Twain Cave, ride a Mississippi Riverboat, and explore Twain's birthplace in Florida, Missouri.

We invite you to come to Hannibal. Remember—the stories started here!

The Mark Twain Home Foundation is sponsoring this program in partnership with the Missouri Humanities Council. The primary texts are short stories of Mark Twain. Copies of the texts will be supplied to participants. A performance by Mark Twain actor Jim Waddell is included.

FACULTY

Dr. Julie Jackson Albee - Professor of Education, Hannibal-LaGrange University (HLGU) – co-author of *Reading Assessment for Diagnostic-Prescriptive Teaching*. She loves teaching, reading and writing. Dr. Albee currently teaches graduate and undergraduate courses in Reading and Writing and has taught first through eighth graders in the regular and gifted classrooms and high school math.

Henry Sweets – Executive Director of Mark Twain Boyhood Home & Museum, Hannibal, MO – Forty-one years with the Mark Twain Museum, editor of museum publication *The Fence Painter*, many speaking engagements and programs.

Dr. Bruce Michelson - The author of *Mark Twain on the Loose* and *Printer's Devil: Mark Twain and the American Publishing Revolution*, as well as many articles and book chapters about Mark Twain and other writers, Bruce Michelson is Professor Emeritus of American Literature at the University of Illinois, and a past president of the Mark Twain Circle of America and The American Humor Studies Association. From the Mark Twain Circle, he was the first recipient of their Louis J. Budd Award for Distinguished Scholarship; in 2018, he received the "Charlie Award," for significant contributions to the study of American Humor, from the AHSA. A Contributing Editor at *Studies in American Humor*, he is also serving as a Fulbright Ambassador, having received two fellowships from the Fulbright Program. At the University of Illinois, he has won the campus 'Distinguished Teacher-Scholar Award,' as well as awards for teaching from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the Department of English. For nearly twenty years, Professor Michelson was Director of the Campus Honors Program

History Presenter – Mark Twain Actor Jim Waddell.

PARTICIPANT PROJECT

Each participant will read selected Mark Twain short stories before coming to the workshop. The selections will be provided to participants ahead of time. At the workshop, participants will prepare a grade-specific lesson plan on a theme from these resources, focusing on the use of primary sources to inspire students' writing. Throughout the week, the lesson plans will be more fully developed with help of the faculty, other participants, and the use of Museum resources. These plans must be finalized within two weeks of the end of the workshop. The completed lesson plans will be then made available through the Museum's web site for other classroom teachers to use.
